Inflation, cost of living, I.M.F. and Prime Minister Fiame

Government has taken on board the findings and recommendations by the International Monetary Fund to assist the country with the Post COVID-19 recovery reforms.

And the Government response, according to Prime Minister Fiame Naomi Mataafa is inclusive with the public and private sectors both contributing to formulate and roll out effective monetary policies and frameworks that will minimize any drastic and unnecessary effects on local residents.

In a one off, One on One interview with the Government Press Secretariat and Savai'i Newspaper, Prime Minister Fiame acknowledged the welcoming signs of a slow and sure recovering economy reported by the I.M.F. team after their annual consultation in January with the Government and Private Finance Sectors which included, commercial banks, lending institutions and Money Transfer Operators.

In particular, she welcomes the I.M.F. findings, which showed that

during the three months period under review, (Oct-Dec. 2022) the local inflation rate dropped by 50% to 7.5 from the previous high of 15.0 due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

And she attributed the drop to Samoa's Opening of her international borders after more than 2 years as a result of the pandemic as the cause of the local economy bouncing back prompted by the in surge of relatives from overseas and visitors.

Like other economics, the Prime Minister says that Samoa is no exemption from the post COVID19 status quo but our local situation is further compounded, due the country's isolation which contributed to additional costs in terms of freight costs coupled by the menacing increase in world petroleum prices which are among the main contributing factors compounding Samoa's plight.

Aside from the inflation drop, the report also welcomed the Government's renewed policy to maintain Samoa's Foreign Debts at not more than 50% of her annual receipts or revenues.

As of January, Samoa Foreign Debts accounts for 45% of her annual receipts down from 51% when the Fiame Administration

Minimum wage and salary reclassification touted

Government is considering a Cost of Living Salary Readjustment, (COLA) for public servants, Prime Minister Fiame Naomi announced this week before she departed overseas for

official engagements with the Commonwealth.

Government, according to the Prime Minister is also looking at reviewing the minimum wage.

The initiative by government is part and parcel of a wide range of financial reforms to help residents and families purchase

power and to tackle the rising inflation and costs of living during the Post COVID-19 era.

And to that effect, the Prime Minister acknowledged that both the Public Service Salary Reclassification and Minimum Wage issues resurfaced earlier this year during the annual

No confirmed measles cases: Director - General Health

The Ministry of Health is maintaining its strict surveillance and monitoring duties for a potential outbreak of measles in the wake of alerts from New Zealand cases resurfacing there.

As of press time, Director General of Health, Aiono Dr. Alec Ekeroma has assured the country that there are no cases of measles in Samoa and health authorities are keeping vigil.

In the aftermath of the 2019 measles outbreak, which claimed 83 lives and infected over 5,700 residents, mostly young children, the Health Sector has aggressively re-launched vaccination programs and continues to do so.

For now, there are no confirmed cases of measles according to Aiono. However, the Ministry's already launched vaccination campaign has coverage rates for Measles-

Mumps-Rubella (MMR) 1 vaccine at 80 per cent and MMR 2 vaccine at 40 per cent.

These rates he said are far higher than what they were in 2019 but MOH continues to try and reach her targets which include 90 per cent coverage for MMR 1 vaccination and 80 per cent coverage for MMR 2.

Aiono is confident the measles coverage across the country will not have Samoa experience the tragic outcome of the 2019 outbreak.

So far, according to Aiono the suspected cases of measles from two/three weeks ago have been ruled out after blood testing in New Zealand but MoH awaits test results for two more suspected cases that showed up last weekend.

Meanwhile while awaiting results, Aiono claims the Ministry is currently conducting contact tracing to aid in their monitoring work.

But, the first PM of Samoa also noted that in order for this world to exist joint courage by all UN member countries is a necessary ingredient.


"A world without violence is possible, and this moment demands unparalleled courage and joint action to make this vision a reality," she said in her statement.

Laauli welcomes Chinese agricultural experts

Samoa is hosting three experts from China here to aid in boosting the country's agricultural and fisheries developments under the Samoa China Agriculture Technical Aid Project (SCATAP).

Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries (MAF) Laauli Leuatea Polataivao Fosi welcomed the trio who will be in the country for the next three (3) months to prepare the country for the project's Phase VI.

The three will aid in creating learning opportunities emphasizing fisheries, food and veterinarian work according to the minister.

He said their being in Samoa will also create more valuable results for the project and it is really important for the next phase.

The Minister revealed that the research to be carried out by the

experts for the next three months will allow them to design the sixth phase of the project.

The three experts are:

- Professor Xiang Jin Fu (Food Science & Technology)
- Professor Wang He (Fishery)
- Dr. Binghua Zhou (Veterinary)

The delegation from China and SCATAP is led by Team Leader Dr. Jim Liu and met with not just the Minister but MAF Chief Executive Officer (CEO) Tilafono David Hunter, and the Ministry's Associate Minister Maiava Fuimaono Tito early this week.

SCATAP was initiated in 2010 to help Samoan farmers enhance their sustainable livelihoods through agricultural production, increasing farmers income and contributing to sustainable development in the country.

came into office. And latest reports show that the Government's Foreign Debt is under \$1 billion tala.

For the current fiscal year, the Government's approved Statutory Expenditures Budget is a little over \$130 million tala. And over 80% of that budgeted allocation will pay Government debts and loans.

Samoa's Foreign Reserves account is also healthy reassures the Prime Minister.

At last report in January, the Government's Foreign Reserve was in the \$800 million tala neighborhood, adequate to cover exports for the country's need for 8 months.

"Like any responsible Government, rest assure the horrors from past when we did not have sufficient funds to procure petrol

and food imports will remain in the past," she reiterated reassuring that this is one of the priority issues under the Government's financial brains.

As for access to finances and policies to help the Private Finance Sector, Prime Minister says that Government also welcomes recommendations from the I.M.F. for the Central Bank of Samoa to revisit her local monetary policies and regulations.

She says that the suggestion for the Central Bank to impose regulatory money policies to strengthen access by the public to finance through their services is ideal but with the same token the Prime Minister pointed out that there should be monitoring conditions that will enable the Central Bank to take

appropriate actions if there are issues and problems.

And for the public, Fiame did not shy away from the Government's \$1 million tala Development initiatives for the 51 Electoral Constituencies describing the bold initiative as a "genuine inclusive" mandate by Government for everyone to invest in the future of their families, communities and their government.

"Government is planting the seeds for what we envision as a new beginning for electorates to learn the value of investments in their future, their families and the communities," she said noting that like any new ideas, there will be teething problems but with the same token, she is confident that the Government's inclusive approach will bear fruit.

review between government, the private sector and the International Monetary Fund.

"Our residents income power is one of the founding policies of this government and increasing wages like before boils down to affordability and whether government coffers can sustain a wage increase to help with the cost of living as a result of POST COVID19 recovery period," reassures Fiame.

"Anything can happen before the end of this financial year, (June 30th

2023)," hinted the Prime Minister without elaborating.

Samoa's minimum wage of \$3 tala an hour was last readjusted in January 2020. And Government has since been haunted by political arch rivals and non-government organizations to increase the minimum income power. However, one of the main setbacks is the affordability and adverse impact of any dramatic minimum increase of wages private sector and businesses.

Government last implemented a COLA initiative in 2019.

Japan funds U.S.P. Savai'i Center renovations

The Savaii Centre of the University of the South Pacific (U.S.P.) will be receiving a new phase lift thanks to the Government of Japan's funding of WST\$493,000 to renovate the facility.

The funding will go towards repairs for the roof, ceiling, walling, flooring, doors, electricity and plumbing systems.

It will also go towards the construction of a new ramp, walkway between the center and outside of the toilet block and installing a security fence around the property.

The Savaii centre of the university is located in the Ministry of Education, Sports and Culture (M.E.S.C.) Library at Salelologa.

The fund was revealed at the Japanese Government's signing ceremony between Japanese Ambassador to Samoa, the Ministry of Education, Sports and Culture (M.E.S.C.) and U.S.P. early this week at the U.S.P. Library Conference Room at Alafua.

Japan's Ambassador to Samoa Keisuke Senta said Japan was pleased to fund the renovations of the building as a milestone marking the 50th Anniversary of diplomatic ties between his country and Samoa.

"The Government of Japan continues to assist and commit to improving its relations with the Government of the Independent State of Samoa through its GGP scheme."

The ambassador was referring to the Government of Japan's Grant Assistance for

Australian Government unveils audiology booths – a first for Samoa

The Government's ability to diagnose and treat hearing impairments for her people in all ages has just been boosted thanks to assistance from the Government of Australia.

The Ministry of Health last week Friday at the celebration of World hearing Day to mark this special event received four audiology booths for the newly established Samoa National Hearing Centre – a first for Samoa.

The booths will aid in early detection of ear problems for patients that come in with medical hearing difficulties and most importantly a service that is accessible at the local level.

The hearing program that enabled the assistance to be provided also supplies hearing aids, batteries and other equipment plus training to address fitting and maintenance of hearing aids.

Another additional service under the program is training for Primary Ear Health Care to health workers allowing them to screen newborns and young children and treat them at the earliest.

The assistance was made possible through the Samoa Hearing Program, a partnership between MOH, SENESE, and the Australian Government through the Royal Australian College of Surgeons (RACS).

High Commissioner to Samoa Emily Luck said they were

pleased to work with their partners towards making hearing care services accessible and affordable to the people of Samoa.

"The unveiling of these booths will have a significant impact on the Government's ability to continue its work in providing these important health services."

Minister of Health Valasi Luapitofanua Toogamaga Tafito Selesete further reiterated that the partnership between the two governments to provide quality and accessible health care is a testament to the strength of the relationship.

According to the Minister it is reported that 1.5 billion people globally have hearing impairments and close to 430 million are affected with long-term hearing.

The majority of those with hearing impairment caused by the lack of opportunities available for services and treatment are from developing countries with low economic status including Samoa.

Experts believe that these numbers will increase in the future due to the growth of entertainment that utilises audio amplifiers or loud speakers.

The most unfortunate factor about the sprout in hearing impairment is that the causes and sources of ear infections and hearing loss are preventable and treatable said the minister.

And with the 60 per cent of children with ear infections and hearing loss, these situations can be resolved, through the implementation of public health promotion and prevention

methods, as well as appropriate treatment.

If all services for Health Care for Ears are implemented properly, the quality of hearing of the public will also improve the minister stressed.

According to the Ministry's Ear, Nose and Throat (ENT) Clinic the number of patients with hearing deficiencies has grown severely since 2017 due to ear problems.

- 77 per cent with hearing impairments that led to hearing loss,
- 52 per cent of patients suffered from ear infections due to germs and
- 7 per cent of children visited in Primary schools in Upolu suffered from severe ear infections

These he said were the figures that prompted the notion that ear health care for all people should be prioritised.

Valasi advised the public to adhere to the proper methods of protection and care of ears, and called to cease smoking in families, wash hands at all times, keep a distance from people with running noses, coughs and suffer from the flu, and to see a doctor at the earliest, and refrain from inserting foreign materials into ear canals when feeling some signs of ear problems.

The minister also made clear that immunization for all children will be enforced at scheduled times to aid in protection from ear problems.

Lautimuia sworn-in as Member of Parliament for Vaimauga #3

The winner of the Vaimauga #3 by-election Lautimuia Afoa Uelese Vaai is officially a Member of Parliament.

He was sworn-in by Speaker of the House, Papalii Lio Taeu Masipau on Tuesday morning in the presence of the Legislative Assembly of Samoa, family and friends.

Lautimuia who secured 1531 votes in the elections praised God and expressed how humbled he was by the support shown by his constituency in their presence at the Parliament House for his swearing in.

He also extended his appreciation to his family and friends for their patience and endless encouragement.

The MP contested the seat under the flag of the Faatuatua I le Atua Samoa ua Tasi (FAST) Party.

The newly sworn-in Lautimuia was the former Samoa Shipping Services (S.S.S.) General Manager before he resigned to run in the by-elections for Vaimauga #3.

He replaces the late veteran Member of Parliament for the constituency Tapunu Niko Lee Hang who passed away last year.

Lautimuia challenged the seat with Human Rights Protection Party (HRPP) candidate Samau Leatigagaeono Solitamalii Timani (1082 votes), and Independent candidate Feagaimaalii Bruce Toomalatai Utaileuo (106 votes).

The 34-year-old from Faleasiu in the Constituency of Aana Alofi #1 has been making a living selling lemons and lime for \$5 tala per bag for the past 3 years.

And, this is what financially supports his family.

While at the exhibition of the First Harvest (Ulua'i Seleselega)

of Aana Alofi 1 on Saturday last week he showcased his wares with pride.

The event organised by the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries plays the role of a platform for farmers from the constituency to showcase their hard work from their plantations, fishery projects and farms.

Motu was most excited about the initial exhibition at Faleasiu and expressed his appreciation for the opportunity that has allowed him to showcase his produce that puts food on the table and funds many of his other family commitments.

He was also stoked that the event will now be hosted annually.

"It is really good – I thank the Government for this wonderful programme," Motu told the Savali Newspaper.

And while at the exhibition the enthusiastic entrepreneur took advantage of the platform and brought some of his produce to sell there – by afternoon they were sold out.

Other farmers showed off their crops, fish and chickens and many made good sales from the visitors who attended the Aana Alofi #1 First Harvest.

I am honoured to be invited to make a voluntary presentation to this landmark event in honour of Championing Gender Equality for International Women's Day as well as highlighting economic empowerment for women through entrepreneurship.

According to the 2020 Statistics on Women and Leadership, I fall into the category of less than 7% of country leaders who are women. SDG 5 posits that Gender equality means ensuring full and effective participation and equal opportunities for leadership. The rationale is not just about equity, fairness and rights in representation but that it makes for stronger governance and better economic outcomes.

The Samoa Policy for Gender Equality 2021-2031 identifies seven key strategic priorities including:

Increased economic empowerment, Improved health outcomes, enhanced access and opportunities for life-long learning and educational outcomes, Improved gender balance in leadership, governance, and public life; increased and improved safety and access to law and justice; increased gender sensitivity and social inclusion in all infrastructure developments and governance; increased visibility, contribution and engagement of women and girls in agriculture, climate change, natural resources management and disaster preparedness and response; for all women and girls especially those facing intersecting barriers and forms of discrimination.

The Policy includes an implementation plan, which discusses governance and implementation arrangements, monitoring and evaluation frameworks, and implementing agencies and their roles.

In March 2021, women comprised 43.1% of employees in the formal sector. The top three industries for formal employment were public administration, commerce and Other services. Only Commerce had a slightly higher 'male' employee composition than women.

The main Entrepreneurship challenges we face are by way of opening up new opportunities to remove obstacles through the creation of networks including public and private collaborations; supporting women owned ecosystem and the recognitions of services essential for their roles as multitaskers. We are also aware that we need robust data to be able to identify opportunity gaps.

Financial inclusion has advanced with an expanded outreach to the rural areas and has been more marked post COVID in our gradual recovery. As well the lessons learnt from the pandemic have accelerated progress on the implementation of our e-commerce policy and the uptake of innovative Apps for marketing purposes and associated capacity building initiatives.

COVID 19 also provided opportunities that demonstrated the resourcefulness of our entrepreneurs by building products that targeted specific customers as a result of the restrictions such as the surge of competitive catering businesses with deliveries using 'Uber' services – all remain operational today

I take this opportunity to thank all our development partners who have supported us through investments in solutions to ensure the economic empowerment of our women and girls.




