Samoa Medical Diagnostics Laboratory opens at S.F.H.A. Headquarters at Motootua

There’s a new diagnostic laboratory in Apia. The newly launched Samoa Medical Diagnostics Laboratory is housed by the Samoa Family Health Association at their headquarters at Moto’otua.

The newly established services has been in the pipeline for some time but due to Covid19 was put on hold until now. But the new services means less waiting time for patients requiring blood testing for medical purposes as well as opportunity for screening cervical and prostate cancer.

This also means that with this new available laboratory open for service there is an option for people in the community complementing the Ministry of Health’s (MoH) own services.

This set up, is a fully functional diagnostic laboratory supported in partnership with the Pacific Laboratory Specialists, Samoa Family Health Association, the International Planned Parenthood Federation Sub-Regional Office for the Pacific, and the Australian Government, through the Business Partnerships Platform (BPP) program.

All technical services will be executed by technicians of the Pacific Laboratory Specialists (P.L.S.), a business from Fiji that aims to be the largest provider of pathology services to hospitals in their country and the Pacific.

Staff from the S.F.H.A. will be on standby to provide appropriate assistance when required.

But, P.L.S. caters to some of the Pacific’s leading private hospital groups and perform a comprehensive range of services for doctors, patients and corporate clients including; All routine pathology tests, Advanced pathology, First trimester screening & Non-Invasive Prenatal testing, Chemical pathology, Haematology, Histopathology, Immunology, Serology and

Government's \$3 million petrol station opens at Tuanaimato

The Government of Samoa has opened the doors of its brand new petrol station for refueling of all Government vehicles.

The petrol station was officially opened in a ribbon cutting ceremony by outgoing Minister of Finance Mulipola Anarosa Ale Molioo and the new Minister of Finance Lautimuia Uelese Afoa Vaai.

In her keynote address, Mulipola says that the total cost of the project is \$3 million and is fully Government funded.

The cost includes; 1 acre of land, half an acre of that is used for the petrol station, the office, and a storage for the Ministry of Finance's records.

The other half is planned to be the location of the transport sector for the Commonwealth Heads of Government Meeting (C.H.O.G.M.) next year.

The petrol station includes 4 dispensers, 3 underground tanks with a storage capacity of 25,000 liters for diesel and 15,000 for petrol.

According to Mulipola the new petrol station will be an assistance during natural disasters, and serve all government vehicles to be refueled in one location.

Ministry vehicles are currently being refueled here with Public Enterprises or State Owned Enterprises to soon follow.

She thanked the Prime Minister and Cabinet for their support towards this project and acknowledged the partnership with private petrol stations Pesega Service Station and T&N Toleafoa Service Station for their services through the years.

14 years on, Samoa remembers

Samoa's will always remember the 29th of September 2009.

It was the day when an 8.1 magnitude earthquake shook the nation followed by 20 meter high tsunami waves that claimed the lives of many without discrimination.

14 years on, the memories remain and the lives lost have not been forgotten.

The 2009 tsunami was triggered by at least two separate earthquakes occurring within 2-3 minutes of each other near the Tonga Trench.

Samoa was not alone while it claimed 149 lives on our shores, our neighbours American Samoa lost 34 lives while 9 people were claimed by the impacts of the disaster in Tonga.

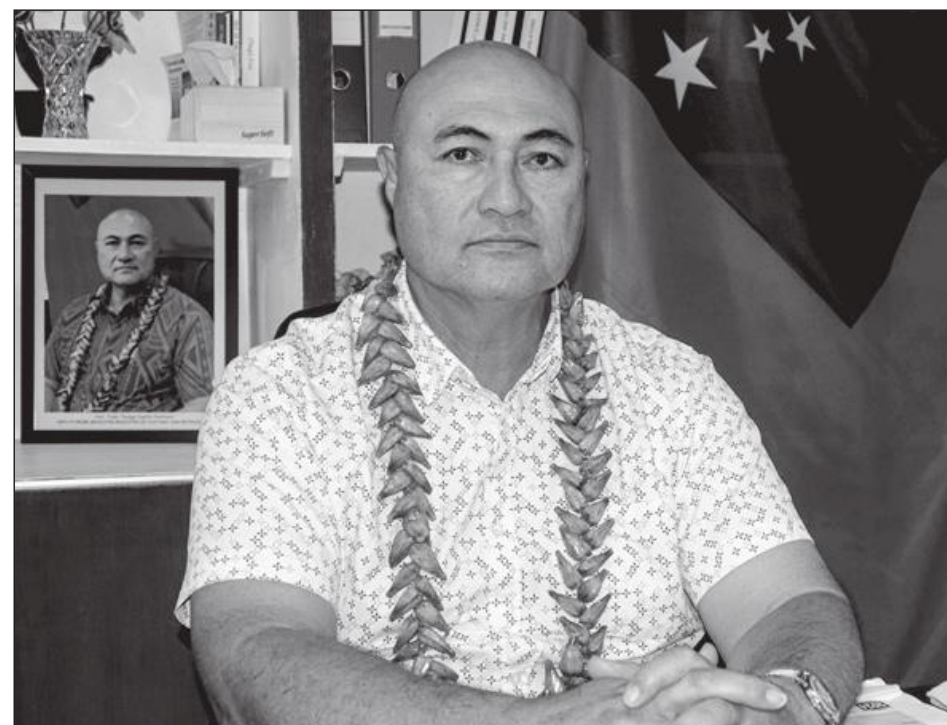
On Friday, the Acting Prime Minister Tuala Tevaga Iosefo Ponifasio and Members of Cabinet laid wreaths at the Tsunami 2009 Commemorative Headstone Stone at Tuanaimato cemetery, remembering the lives that were lost on that dark day.

In a statement, Tuala said that the daunting sound and splashes of tsunami waves, fear, and disarray of that day, may never be forgotten – especially for the families of the casualties.

"Amongst the casualties were parents, children and visitors from overseas who were visiting our shores at the time."

And, among these children was a child who was five months old.

"The horrendous impacts of the Tsunami 2009 on our country and people were devastating, but through the support of government agencies, civil society organizations, village and

communities and our development partners, we were able to rebuild from this devastation."

Tuala however acknowledged that "above all it was the grace of God that saved us, and helped our country to rebuild."

Friday also served as a reminder that the climate crisis is real and its effects are detrimental to the environment and our lives especially for small island countries like Samoa reminded the Acting Prime Minister.

"The current global trends in weather and climatic patterns attest to the urgent need

for greater and stronger concerted efforts to respond to climate crisis and to strategise ways to strengthen countries resilience and recovery abilities."

He says that this has been done through Samoa's regular engagement in national, regional and international fora, and through genuine partnerships.

"On behalf of the Honourable Prime Minister and Cabinet, I convey our prayers and well wishes to all families and relatives of those who lost their lives in the 2009 tsunami."

Students taught about history of the Tatau

Students from various schools had the opportunity to learn about the tatau and see for themselves the process of Samoan tattooing from Grandmaster Tattooist, Su’a Suluape Alaivaa Petelo.

Those in attendance heard from Su’a of the history and meaning of the tatau, tools and traditions, while seeing up close the tatau session on stage and the demonstration of the ‘samaga’ ceremony.

Speaking to the media on Friday, Su’a says that plans on hosting an exhibition started when students kept on approaching him for assistance in their school’s Internal Assessment (I.A.).

He says that this would usually disrupt their work and since the students could not come at another time he would obviously supply them with the information they required.

As a result the grandmaster Su’a came up with the idea of having the students gather all at once where he would then be able to provide the information they needed.

However, another important idea riding on the exhibition was to ensure that the correct and most accurate information was delivered and received by students.

According to Su’a there was many inaccuracies in information on television provided to the students and was concerning.

He initially planned to go on television regarding the issue as he wanted the students to be equipped with the accurate information, but had then went with the plan to host the exhibition where he was able to personally deliver the information.

Minister of Education and Culture Seuula Ioane Tuā’au stated during the exhibition that

the tatau is more than just an ink on skin, it embodies the very essence of who we are as Samoan people.

“It serves as a testament to our heritage, our values, and our enduring connection to our culture,” Seuula says.

“In every intricate design etched into the skin, we find not only a work of art but a story of resilience, tradition and identity.”

He explained that the Tatau serves a dual purpose, it is both a mark of personal identity

and a commitment to the collective identity of our Samoan community.

Seuula added that it is also a rite of passage, a symbol of honour, and a bridge between the past, present, and future.

The event was hosted by the Malofie Association through aid assistance from the New Zealand High Commission to Samoa.

Rugby League World Cup stars return in Toa Samoa squad

Rugby League Samoa has revealed their Toa Samoa squad for the upcoming Pacific Championships, which include the history makers from last year's Rugby League World Cup.

Stephen Crichton, Royce Hunt, Spencer Leniu, Junior Paulo, Izack Tago, Brian To'o, and Connelly Lemuelu have returned to represent their country after being named in this year's Toa Samoa Pacific Championships squad who will face the Australian Kangaroos and the New Zealand Kiwis.

This will also mark the first time the Toa Samoa will be coached by Penrith Panthers Assistant Coach and former Kiwis Assistant Coach Ben Gardiner.

The team was officially revealed on Tuesday evening.

The Toa Samoa will be led by Captain Junior Paulo of the Parramatta Eels, who led the team last year to their first ever Rugby League World Cup Final, and will feature Premiership-winning Penrith Panthers quartet Stephen Crichton, Spencer Leniu, Izack Tago and Brian To'o.

Jarome Luai however has been ruled out with a shoulder injury.

The squad also includes Brisbane Broncos duo Keenan Palasia and Jesse Arthars.

North Queensland Cowboys Murray Taulagi will be wearing the blue jersey this time after he was part of the Australia Kangaroos in last year's Australia's Rugby League World Cup Kangaroos and recently the Australian Prime Minister's XIII in Papua New Guinea.

Hamiso Tabuai-Fidow who played for the Toa Samoa in the Rugby League World Cup last year has joined the Australian Kangaroos for the Pacific Championships.

Faamanu Brown and Danny Levi who were also part of the Toa Samoa squad last year will now be playing for the New Zealand Kiwis.

microbiology, Functional pathology and Commercial drug & alcohol testing according to their web page.

Senior Lab Technician for the company, Josese Mailulu says the laboratory will not just help to continue the story of people but also it's going to save a lot of lives.

Touching upon the statistics of people suffering from cancer he revealed that this laboratory and the machines available to carry out the work will be able to give early detection of cancers affecting people.

This means that early intervention will be made possible, lives will saved, and the age group of people of those affected by cancer normally in the 40s to 50 will be reduced to the 20s.

He said that the next plan is to take the service to the villages, to the communities, instead of people coming to them, since many people are unable to visit the clinic because they do not have the funds for bus fares, and other reasons.

Mailulu says their services will mean tests that took three days to wait for an outcome, will now be received in just one day, while tests that often took a week will take 3 days.

35 participants from 17 Pacific nations are in Samoa attending the Youth Pacific Leaders (YPL) Regional Workshop at Taumeasina Island Resort.

The three-day meeting, focusing on Embracing Equity, Inclusion and Human Rights, was officially opened on Wednesday morning with emerging leader participants looking at various salient topics across the region they can develop tangible solutions to.

Chief Executive Officer of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade (M.F.A.T.) Peseta Noumea Simi, in her remarks commended all Pacific youth actively participating in vigorous debates on various salient topics such as; climate change, environmental conservation and climate action, disaster risk management and reduction, health, cultural development, education and human rights reaffirming the priorities of the Pacific region.

Embracing equity, fostering inclusion and upholding human rights, she said was not a mere aspiration, but imperative and requires courage, empathy, and a relentless commitment to justice.

"It demands that we challenge the status quo and work towards dismantling systems that perpetuate inequality. It calls for conversations that may be uncomfortable but necessary for growth."

As envisioned, said Peseta, youth participation in these leadership gatherings open doors to invaluable views, opinions and creative solutions which otherwise would not be heard.

"This workshop will provide an invaluable space for dialogue and learning. It will create a space for building a Blue Pacific youth narrative on important issues."



Addressing the participants further Peseta said it was no doubt they were chosen for their extraordinary potential in addressing salient topics across the region and cooperating to generate tangible solutions.

But, reminded the participants that to embrace equity one would have to acknowledge and breakdown barriers that deterred one from realising their full potential.

It is about understanding that equality does not mean treating everyone the same, but rather recognising and addressing the unique challenges faced by different individuals and communities says the M.F.A.T. C.E.O.

"As Young Pacific Leaders, you are the architects of the present, capable of paving the way towards a more just and equitable future."

Inclusion on the other hand is not a passive state but an active commitment which is about intentionally creating spaces where diversity is not just tolerated, but celebrated, she added.

"It is ensuring that every voice, regardless of origin, is not only welcome at the table but is

an integral part of shaping the conversation."

According to Peseta, encouraging inclusive environment, will not only enrich communities but also harness the collective wisdom and strength of our diverse perspectives.

She then touched upon human rights and referred to this as the compass that guides individuals towards a world where dignity is universal.

"As we champion equity and inclusion, let us never forget the foundational principles that underpin our shared humanity."

Every person has inherent rights that are inviolable, regardless of their race, gender, religion, or any other characteristic she said.

And, as young leaders she told the participants, they have the power to be the advocates and defenders of these rights, ensuring that they are upheld for everyone, without exception.

"In the implementation of the 2030 sustainable development agenda, our Pacific youth are collaborative partners through

durable partnerships with all relevant stakeholders that will pave the way for transformation and bridge the need for capacity and opportunities for youth."

Peseta said that it will also provide enabling policy environments to cater for young people of all abilities and that only through meaningful dialogue across generations "can we contribute to finding solutions to the challenges we face in the Pacific today".

United States (U.S.) Chargé d'Affaires Noriko Horiuchi revealed to the participants they were selected from over a 100 applicants that signed up for this workshop.

She said the first meeting of the Young Pacific Leaders occurred in 2013 in American Samoa, and designed to bring together young people facing same challenges across the region to discuss ways to address these.

The workshop empowers young people to making positive changes to the world. She also revealed that participants can be eligible to YPL short and long term fellowship programs.
