## It's raining gold for Team Samoa

**From the Pacific Games 2023, in the Solomon Islands, Team Samoa has rapidly climbed up the medal tally after valiant efforts in various sports earning gold for Samoa.**

As of Thursday, Team Samoa already bagged 13 gold medals, 5 silver and 3 bronze, now in third place of the medal standings for the 2023 Pacific Games in the Solomon Islands.

Samoa struck their first gold thanks to the brave efforts of swimmer Olivia Borg in the 100m butterfly, and days later securing another gold for the 50m freestyle.

Speaking to Francis Vaigalepa of S.A.S.N.O.C. media after receiving her medal, she expressed how amazing it was to be Samoa's first gold medalist in this year's Pacific Games and is happy with the outcome.

"Thank you everyone for the support, I am really happy to bring home this gold."

Olivia had lit the spark that led to Samoa's golden achievements in the Solomon Islands.

Samoa's tennis team has not disappointed also taking gold soon after, followed by our weightlifting team that has been Samoa's highlight of the games.

Nevo Ioane secured three gold medals in the 67kg division, breaking the Pacific Games record and setting a new Oceania record.

His teammate John Tafi also brought in three gold medals for Samoa in the 73kg division breaking his own record in the process.

On Wednesday evening, the Men Rugby League 9s team were successful in earning gold after demolishing Fiji in the finals 8-0.

More recently, Maeu Nanai Livi dominated the Mens 96kg division at

## Ground broken for \$5.8 million Vaigaga Primary School building

The students of Vaigaga Primary school will soon be carrying out their school lessons in a climate resilient building once construction of their new school is completed.

The ground for the site's project was broken yesterday at the school compound in a small but historical event for the village.

The rebuilt project replaces a modern structure constructed in 1984 that was deemed 'to be one of the most vulnerable school buildings in a risk assessment conducted in 2019'.

The school has served the village's children and many others from neighbouring areas for the past 63 years.

Prior to the modern building erected in the 1980's the first structure for carrying out school lessons that was conducted by clergy men was in 'a simple stone house' and built in 1960.

Prime Minister Fiame Naomi Mataafa in her keynote address revealed the project costs a total of \$5.8million.

Referring to the project as an 'important contribution to our national efforts to build resilient infrastructure to

# Australia hands over Nafanua III to Samoa Police

The new Guardian Class Patrol Boat, Nafanua III, is now in the hands of the Samoa Police after it was handed over by the Government of Australia in Perth on Wednesday.

Speaking on behalf of the Government of Samoa, Minister of Police, Prisons, and Corrections Services Faualo Harry Schuster said the gifting of the vessel is a power tool in efforts to secure Samoa's maritime borders and protect national interests.

"The vessel is fast, maneuverable, and equipped with state of the art technology and capabilities that will further enable the Samoa Police to effectively respond to a wide range of maritime threats and play a crucial role in search and rescue operations as well as humanitarian assistance and disaster response efforts," he the Minister.

The vessel replaces the Nafanua II which ran aground in Savaii in 2021.

Faualo says the time serves as a stark reminder of the importance of vigilance, training, and adherence to established procedures in the realm of maritime operations.

"Whilst this incident was deeply troubling, it has provided the Samoan Government with an opportunity to introspect, identify shortcomings, and implement corrective measures to prevent similar occurrences in the future. In this regard, we respectfully wish to take this opportunity to apologize to the Australian Government for this shortcoming," he says.

He acknowledged the partnership and friendship between Samoa and Australia.

Noting Australia continues to provide support and assistance during the absence of a patrol boat through the hiring of a local fishing boat to conduct maritime surveillance within our EEZ, search and rescue, ongoing training and professional development to further up-skill the men and women of the Samoa Police Maritime; and technical assistance provided

by the 2 maritime advisors that are currently attached to the Samoa Maritime Police.

"We acknowledge this support with much appreciation," said Faualo.

The Police minister expressed his sincere gratitude to the Australian Government for gifting Samoa its 3rd Patrol Boat, which is a testament to the commitment of the Australian Government to working with its

Pacific counterparts to strengthen maritime security in the Pacific region.

"It is my hope that the partnership between the Samoan Government and the Government of Australia will continue to remain firm and grow even greater in years to come," he says.

Adding that the commissioning of Samoa's new Guardian class patrol boat is a proud day for Samoa, and that the vessel is a symbol of

Samoa's commitment to maritime security and dedication to our Samoa's prosperity and well-being.

"May the Guardian class patrol boat serve our Samoa and the Pacific with distinction and help to keep our waters safe for generations to come," he says.

# P.M. applauds climate resilient features for New Zealand's new Letava Complex

The Government of New Zealand has broken ground for the site for its Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade's Pacific Property Systems Project activity.

The event held at Letava on Tuesday morning saw Prime Minister Fiamē Naomi Mataafa give remarks.

She thanked the New Zealand High Commissioner to Samoa his Excellency, Dr Trevor Matheson, for the invitation to join 'for the ground breaking ceremony and blessing' of the project.

She applauded the 'objective of the project that will see the construction of climate proofed accommodation and infrastructure assets across the Pacific'.

According to Fiamē this "will ensure sustainable diplomatic properties that are fit for purpose and durable, particularly for environments that are vulnerable to the effects of climate change including natural disasters."

The Pacific Property System Project delivers infrastructure assets and accommodation across the Pacific and is driven by New Zealand's Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade (MFAT).

Project works include civil and vertical construction upgrade to seven

countries including Samoa.

"Today marks the start of this initiative in Samoa and will include many other Pacific countries," said the Prime Minister.

The other countries are; the Solomon Islands, Kiribati, Niue, Tonga, Papua New Guinea and Fiji.

The Project sees the construction of accommodation and infrastructure assets across the Pacific ensuring properties are fit for purpose and can continue to support the New Zealand government's important work in the region.

The initiative is expected to prepare for impacts of climate change that is already felt by many countries in the Pacific by working on sustainability and reducing carbon footprint on the projects.

"We congratulate the New Zealand Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade for the initiative to upgrade the residences of the seconded staff," said Prime Minister Fiamē.

She referred to the upgrade as timely 'given the accommodation complex here at Letava is now 60 years old'.

"The construction will also provide economic opportunities for the contractors and local labour," she pointed out.

"We look forward to a new face of Letava over the coming months."

## Samoa committed to protecting the rights of every child

As the world celebrates World Children's Day, the Minister of Women, Community, and Social Development Mulipola Anarosa Ale-Molio'o has voiced Samoa's commitment to promoting and protecting the rights of every child.

According to Minister Mulipola this has always been the case since the ratification by Samoa of the Convention on the Rights of the Child in 1994.

The Minister was keynote speaker at the opening of the Convention of the Rights of the Child Follow up visit to the Pacific.

Since Samoa ratified the convention the country, has taken measure to ensure that children can live healthy and happy lives without fear of violence or hunger.

"We have made progress in education, which is compulsory and free of charge in public schools, with universal access to primary education."

The number of children with disabilities who are enrolled in schools has increased also she added.

"Villages are reinforcing by-laws to punish

perpetrators of violence."

But, the minister says more must be done to protect the children from harm.

Ensuring 'that they can live their lives to the fullest through a whole-of-government approach'.

This approach should involve parents, village leaders, churches, and teachers.

Minister Mulipola also highlighted this year being the 75th Anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights.

And with that she says Government pledges to improve access to education for children with disabilities.

And, to ensure that the Child Protection and Care Bill is in compliance with the Convention and is adopted without further delay; and to increase budgetary resources allocated to children's rights, she stressed.

"Children's rights must be a priority of our leaders, and so these pledges are an integral part of the broader set of human rights pledges that our Prime Minister made last week, at the Pacific Islands Forum Leaders' Meeting where she had addressed a side event on Human Rights 75 organised by the UN and partners."

# More discussion around sexual abuse need: Judge Vui

Justice Vui Clarence Nelson feels that building awareness against assault and sexual abuse should start in schools.

He also feels that the law should not be the only solution to this offense.

Responding to queries from the media during a press conference of the CRC Follow-up visit to Samoa the law he says is just one tool used by judges and by the courts to deter people from carrying out such actions.

The judges and courts are able to do this by applying tougher sentencing on sexual abuse offenders.

“But that’s only one tool. You’ve got to adopt a holistic approach in this kind of thing,” says Justice Vui.

“It’s not just about the judges doing the job of sentencing offenders because [...] we’re at the bottom of the cliff, we are the ambulance at the bottom of the cliff and by the time it gets to us the guy has already committed the offence [and] the victim is now a victim.

And that title he says will ‘probably stick for life as a result of the offending and judges can’t change that doesn’t matter what we do with the offender’.

That means it will be difficult to return the victim to their previous character or persona and their life following the experience.

The only thing that can be done is to deal with the offender.

As a result Justice Vui wants better solutions – options to deter such cases coming through the court system.

“And the law is only just one tool but as I said it’s a tool that’s found at the wrong end of the spectrum.”

As a result he feels ‘before that there’s got to be a lot of work that needs to be done in the area of sexual abuse for example in schools, in the education system’.

“The issue of sexual abuse is not talked about. What do we teach our children about sexual abuse in the school curriculum? Absolutely nothing!”

He pointed out that there is very little sex education being done at all in schools, not only in Samoa but in the Pacific.

But, feels that approaches like this need to be considered and a conversation is needed on how these can be applied across the board to children in general.

Justice Vui emphasises that there’s a lot of social change that needs to occur and it is just fantasy just to rely on the law being the solution to the problem.

“No that’s not the best solution to the problem, there has to be lots of solutions applied before that,” Judge Vui says.

respond to detrimental effects of climate change’.

Climate change is the ‘single most threat to the livelihoods, resources and wellbeing of humanity across the globe’ she added.

And, Samoa like many other small island countries is ‘most vulnerable to the unprecedented impacts of climate change’.

Funded by the World Bank International Development Association (IDA) the school is a key resilient investment of the Samoa Pacific Resilience Project under the Pacific Resilience Programme says Prime Minister Fiame.

“A project jointly executed and managed by several ministries of Government.”

The main objective of PREP, ‘is to strengthen early warning, resilient investments and financial protection of Samoa’.

One of the key components of the Samoa Pacific Resilience Project says the Prime Minister is to provide entry level resilience investments such as retro fitting, or rebuilding vulnerable schools to meet accepted building standards for resilience’.

“Government continues to prioritise education as one of its key sectors of our social development priorities in the Pathway for the development of Samoa.”


And central to this she says ‘is our drive to improve national literacy and numeracy rates from Early Childhood Education to Primary level and beyond’.

Fiame says, ‘equally important is our regard of the safety and wellbeing of our children while at school’.


“This project attests to that need, and through genuine partnerships at all levels, we will accomplish what we have set out in the PDS.”

She thanked the World Bank for assisting Samoa through PREP in construction of safe school buildings for selected schools in Samoa.

The Vaigaga Primary School is also expected to serve as an evacuation site during an emergency if and when required.

At the Samoa Bureau of Statistics (S.B.S.) Annual Statistics Forum, High Commissioner of Australia to Samoa Emily Luck revealed that Australia's support to the Household Income and Expenditure Survey (HEIS) and strengthening the statistics bureau's communication capability totals 1.2million tala over two years.

This initiative is co-funded by Australia with the Secretariat of the Pacific Community (S.P.C.), the Asian Development Bank and the Government of Samoa.

Their collaboration with the S.B.S. is through the Tautai Partnership with the Samoan Government.

Under the guidance of the Samoa Bureau of Statistics, they have actively facilitated the adoption of innovative technologies and methodologies in the HIES, she said in her keynote address.

"We have provided equipment for the enumerators

traveling throughout Upolu and Savai'i to gather information."

Also under this support are 'software and hardware to crunch the data, ensuring information is accurately collected and facilitating advanced analyses.

Ms Luck explained that Tautai's support includes the provision of a Communications Specialist, which aims to enhance this crucial aspect of data dissemination.

"It's about making sure that the insights gained are shared, understood, and utilised effectively by all stakeholders," she says.

The High Commissioner also extended thanks to the Government statistician Leota Alielua Salani and his team for organising the annual forum bringing people together as the power of data and statistics in shaping a better future.

The Forum was held at the TATTE Convention Centre on Wednesday.

## We can be the solution to combat climate change: Youth Climate Advocate

Climate change is real, and we in the Pacific are on the frontlines of a crisis we barely contribute to.

The actions of others are being felt by small island states that are slowly vanishing due to sea level rise, and a youth climate activist has voiced the possibility of losing her home.

Kylamarie Misi is a student from the University of the South Pacific (USP) and her experience with climate change her passion about the environment is from her home in Salelologa Savaii.

She grew up with her grandfather in Savaii who told her about the differences of his teen days compared to hers.

"His Samoa was completely different from the way my Samoa is," she says.

"They lived almost completely off of the land and sea. The land sea were plentiful and so were their livelihood and their respect for the environment."

Kylamarie says according to her grandfather back then, everything that was used was from the land and to them 'being a steward of the land was part of the Samoan way of life'.

She explained that her grandfather recalls the time where he would find different varieties of sea creatures at the back of their house which is not the case now, added with the ever rising tide behind their home.

Kylamarie says that the lushness of our environment is slowly fading away, the tree leaves are now light green, yellowish, and the nocturnal creatures such as pe'a are no longer seen in some of the villages due to the heat.

"Last week the meteorological office released a statement that there will be three cyclones predicted to reach the shores of Samoa and I cannot help but feel the empathy and the vulnerability for our community."

She is reminded of her grandfather's words of an island visible from Salelologa which he holds fond memories of as a fisherman where they would sit on the sand, play maa musa, and distribute their catch.

"It is sad to say that she is losing parts of her because of the sea level rise and I would say and I would believe if she sinks, Samoa will also sink."

Kylamarie says that speaking with her grandfather she could not help but think about her future grandchildren or children.

"What kind of environment I would leave behind for them as I am now experiencing the sparks of the climate change era."

She fights for the environment and has joined a group called 350 U.S.P. Samoa that would advocate for the environment by doing various projects.

She continues the fight against the climate crisis by joining the reigning Miss Samoa's Ta Fesilafai initiative to learn more about the Samoan culture so she can show the world why she wants to save it.

In terms of finding a solution to climate change, she believes in the Samoan saying "E fofo e le alamea le alamea" even though humans started it, we can be the solution.

The German Embassy in Wellington is lending the Faleatiu Primary school a hand with financial support that will go towards rebuilding of classrooms destroyed in the September 2023 fire.

## SAMOANS KILLED IN TRAGIC ACCIDENT IN AUSTRALIA HONEST AND RELIABLE WORKERS: MINISTER

Finance Minister Lautimuia Afoa Uelese Vaai has extended the Government's sympathies to the families of the four Samoan men killed in a tragic car accident last week while on contract work in Australia.

Minister Lautimuia also oversees the Recognised Seasonal Employer Program under his ministerial portfolio for the Government of Samoa.

So far 16 Samoans have lost their lives while working in New Zealand and Australia under the labour mobility programs since the establishment of both schemes.

A total of 4 while employed under New Zealand's Recognised Seasonal Employer (R.S.E.) scheme since established in 2007 and 12 from the Pacific Australia Labour Mobility (P.A.L.M) program since 2012.

All deaths have been reported to having occurred out of working hours.

The fatal accident occurred in Piries, near Mansfield, 220km north-east of Melbourne when the Kia Carnival vehicle the men were travelling in ploughed into a tree and burst into flames at 7am that day.

All four men were contracted by Flavorite Hydroponics / Murphy Fresh under the Australian Government's Pacific Labour Mobility Program (P.A.L.M.) he revealed to the Savali News in an email.

The names, villages and ages of the men follow;

1. Apera'amo Tapelu, 24 of Letogo, Upolu.
2. Alesana Anitele'a, 34 of Safotu, Savai'i married with a child.
3. David Atonio Gasologa, 27 of Falefā, Upolu.
4. Darrick Amouta Peleti, 28 of Lufilufi and Falevao, Upolu.

According to the minister word of the involvement of the four men working under

the P.A.L.M. program in the traffic incident was received on the evening of 12 November from Samoa's Seasonal Workers Programme Deputy Liaison officer in Sydney Australia.

Records of the time while Tapelu, Anitele'a, Gasologa and Peleti were in the program tells of young men who were 'honest and reliable' in executing their duties and this is not the first time the four have been contracted under the program says Lautimuia.

The men left Samoa for their contract work in Australia on July 2023 and were expected to return home in May 2024 following the end of their contracts.

Representatives from the program have already met with the family members of the young men to notify them of the sad news especially the status of the on-going investigations into cause of their deaths he explained.

"The program continues communication with the families of the status of investigation."

The Ministry of Finance, and Ministry of Foreign Affairs are working together through the High Commission of Samoa to Australia for status of negotiations and release of the deceased bodies to Samoa following investigations.

The cause of the accident could not be confirmed as outcome of the investigation is pending the Minister reconfirmed.

Lautimuia however is asking for the people of Samoa's understanding as he urges for restrain from distribution of unconfirmed information during this sensitive time for the families of the youngmen.

Families and friends of the men have taken to social media and have been reported on overseas media expressing their loss and grief, shock and pain following the incident.

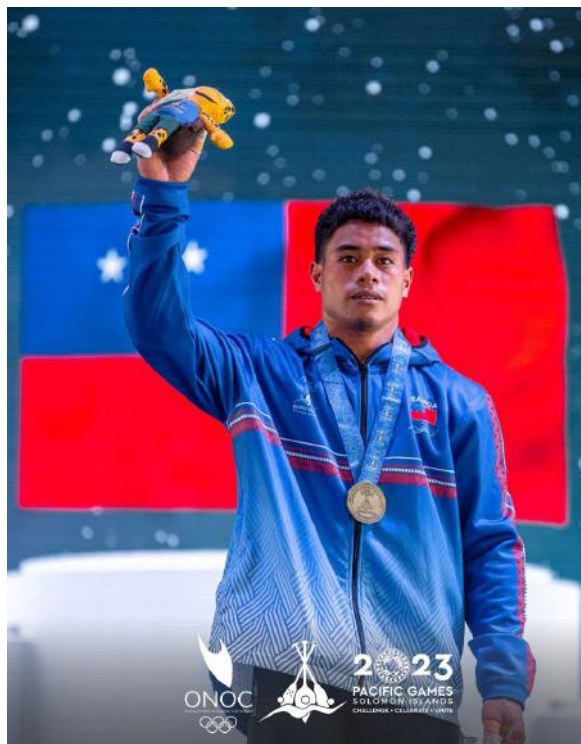

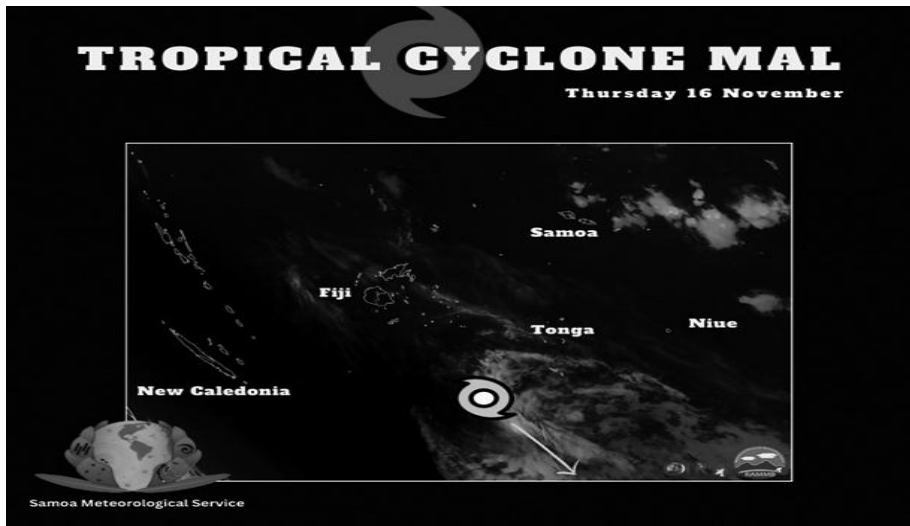

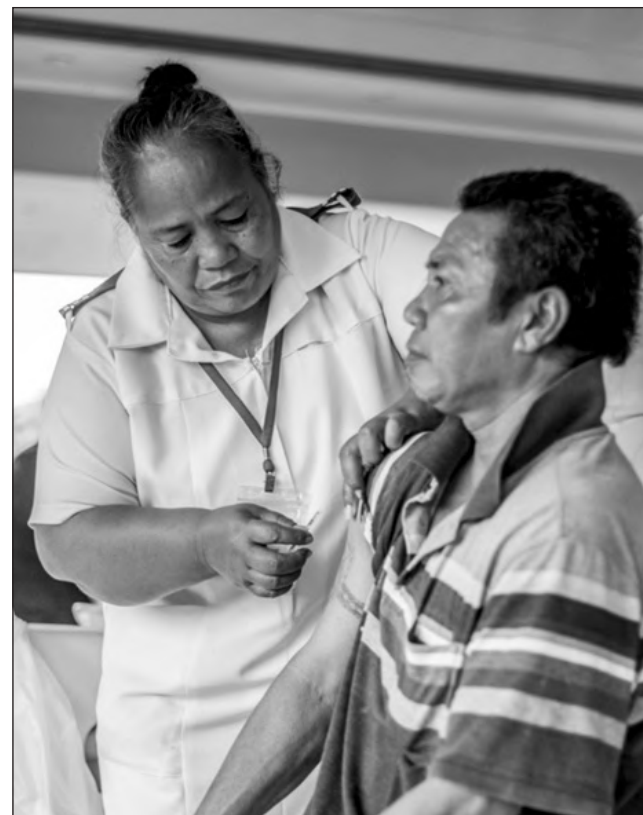
